Alongside him Hunt & Darton will act as encompassing hosts with their spontaneous, witty and awkward style of service, moves, poetry and signage.

For Bodies of Memory, Tate Britain is inhabited by the collective recollections of many past performances, performed and spoken in passing fragments, rising and disappearing like memory itself. Its participants are an intergenerational group of performers, artists, writers, curators: people who have watched something being done.

This durational performance addresses the legacy of the 'art-temple'. In the guise of white-gowned supplicants McKenzie and Williamson lie face down in veneration of the 'words from on high' around the walls, lost in the ecstasy and euphoria emanating from the unseen canvases and plinths.

How can we map the value attributed to art and culture in our society? Barby Asante continues her investigation of the impact of music on identity with a special playlist from the years of the Arts Council's existence.
