

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**ASSEMBLY:
A SURVEY OF RECENT ARTISTS' FILM
AND VIDEO IN BRITAIN 2008 – 2013**

Assembly is a major survey of internationally acclaimed single-screen artists' film and video. Including more than eighty artists, the list is drawn from thirty-six leading international film specialists who were invited to nominate outstanding recent works. Screenings take place at Tate Britain in the Clore Auditorium: on Sundays, feature length films are shown, and on Mondays curated programmes of shorter films are followed by discussions with invited speakers and the artists. Each weekly theme suggests a contested area of practice and prompts a dialogue that continues from one screening to the next, encouraging discussion and debate about contemporary film and video.

The popularity of film and video has surged during the last decade, with screenings occurring in numerous venues from galleries to film festivals, from television to online. The development of digital technology has particularly impacted the distribution, aesthetics and accessibility of artists' cinema. Reflecting this expanded field, *Assembly* is a unique opportunity to consider what is being produced here and now, throwing into relief and celebrating differences across various artists' practices in the medium.

PLEY
Cara Tolmie, 2013
HD video, colour, 19 min

A bespoke structure of the artist's own design is the setting for a series of staged encounters between strangers. The resulting film allows the participants to reflect on the process alongside commentary from the artist herself.

THE EMPTY PLAN
Anja Kirschner and David Panos, 2010
HD video, colour, 78 min

Part melodrama, part historical reconstruction, *The Empty Plan* references the theatre of Bertolt Brecht during his period of exile in Los Angeles, intercut with tensions both geo-political and altogether more personal.

MONUMENTS
Redmond Entwistle, 2010
16 mm, colour, 29 min

This film considers North American industrial supremacy and its slippage in the face of globalisation by vividly restaging artists' urban explorations. The three protagonists represent figures renowned for their site-specific Land Art projects among New Jersey's urban detritus: Dan Graham (born 1942), Robert Smithson (1939–1973) and Gordon Matta-Clark (1943–1978).

Redmond Entwistle (born 1977, London)
Lives and works in New York and London
His work has been shown in a number of festivals and curated programs internationally including: the Rotterdam International Film Festival 2010 and Hors Pistes, Centre Georges Pompidou, Paris (2013). Recent group exhibitions include *Greater New York: Artists Cinema*, PS1 MOMA, New York (2010) and *Nought to Sixty*, ICA, London (2008).

CARLO'S VISION
Rosalind Nashashibi, 2011
16 mm transferred to video, colour, 12 min

Employing a mix of fiction and observation, this film explores the inherent power structures of sexuality and class in Italy, drawing upon an excerpt from Pier Paolo Pasolini's (1922–1975) unfinished novel *Petrolio*.

THE TIGER'S MIND
Beatrice Gibson, 2012
HD video, colour, 23 min

Inspired by a score by Cornelius Cardew and with a cast comprising Tiger (the film's set), Mind (the film's music), Tree (the soundtrack), Wind (special effects), Circle as the director and Amy as the narrator, this unconventional crime thriller grapples with these six relationships on screen against a backdrop of Brutalist architecture.

Beatrice Gibson (born 1978, London)
Lives and works in London
Recent solo screenings, exhibitions and performances include: *The Future's Getting Old Like The Rest Of Us*, Serpentine Gallery (2010), *The Tiger's Mind*, The Showroom, London (2012) and *The Tiger's Mind Re-iterated*, CAC Bretigny (2013). Gibson was a studio artist in residence at the Whitney Museum of American Art's ISP (2007/8).

THE WOOLWORTH'S CHOIR OF 1979
Elizabeth Price, 2012
HD video, colour, 20 min

This video brings together distinct bodies of existing archive material into a dissonant assembly; photographs of church architecture, internet clips of female pop performances from the 1960s and news footage of a devastating fire in a Woolworths department store in 1979.

Elizabeth Price (born 1966, Bradford)
Lives and works in London
Selected exhibitions include forthcoming *Artists' Film International*, Whitechapel Gallery, London (2014) and *Sunlight*, Focal Point Gallery, Southend-on-Sea (2013). Price was nominated for the Jarman Award in 2011 and won the Turner Prize at Tate Britain in 2012.
