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

A JOURNEY THROUGH THE GROUND-BREAKING WORKS OF ONE OF THE MOST INFLUENTIAL ARTISTS OF OUR TIME

Since the late 1960s Bruce Nauman (b.1914) has established a completely new understanding of contemporary art and has been acknowledged as one of the most relevant artists of the twentieth century. Both the last modern artist and – because of his ceaseless experimental approach to new media – the very first contemporary artist, Nauman has been noted for his landmark conceptual approach against which much contemporary art of today can be measured.

Focusing in particular on his experiments with sound, the moving image and immersive installations, this book brings together texts on Nauman's video works of the 1980s and 1990s, as well as on his studio practice and more recent work, along with a conversation between the artist. Andrea Lissoni and Nicholas Serota.

Nauman is here revealed as an artist who blazed a trail through the twentieth century and continues to do so in the twenty-first.





THE EY EXHIBITION: THE MAKING OF RODIN

EDITED BY NABILA ABDEL NABI AND ACHIM BORCHARDT-HUME

A BEAUTIFUL BOOK CELEBRATING RODIN AS THE FATHER OF MODERN SCULPTURE

Auguste Rodin (1840–1917) was a radical sculptor whose unorthodox approach to multiplication, assemblage, industrial production and serial repetition challenged classical sculptural traditions and provided a definitive break in the history of art. Although best known for his bronze and marble sculptures, Rodin's genius was as a modeller, who captured movement, emotion, light and volume in pliable materials such as clay and plaster. Unlike his predecessors, his works include traces of their creation, challenging traditional conceptions of beauty.

In line with new thinking on Rodin, this beautifully illustrated book focuses on the artist's use of plaster, a material which enabled him to create sculptures that are never finished, always becoming. United by their whiteness, fragile and experimental pieces will be explored alongside alternative aspects of some of Rodin's signature works. Including an exclusive

contribution from sculptor Phyllida Barlow, newly commissioned texts will shed light on Rodin's way of working, the importance of modelling, his use of materiality and sexuality, and the role of photography in his work. For the first time, Rodin will be presented as the father of modern sculpture, with an influence that is indisputable.

PRESENTS TURNER AS A PIONEER PAINTER OF CONTEMPORARY LIFE

J.M.W. Turner's (1775–1851) career spanned revolution and the Napoleonic War, the rise of the British Empire, the explosion of finance capitalism, the transition from sail to steam and from manpower to mechanisation, political reform and scientific and cultural advances that transformed society and shaped the modern world. While historians have long recognised that the industrial and political revolutions of the late eighteenth century brought far-reaching change and modernisation, these were often ignored by artists as they did not fit into established categories of pictorial representation.

This exciting new publication shows how Turner updated the language of art and transformed his style and practice to produce revelatory, definitive interpretations of modern subjects. Highlighting Turner's contemporary imagery, the most exceptional and distinctive aspect of his work

throughout his career, this beautifully illustrated book explores what it meant to be a modern artist in Turner's lifetime.

MARIA BARTUSZOVÁ

EDITED BY JULIET BINGHAM AND GABRIELA GARLATYOVÁ

A VISUALLY BREATHTAKING RETROSPECTIVE OF THE EXTRAORDINARY SLOVAK ARTIST

This exquisite book dedicated to Maria Bartuszová (1936–96) will introduce readers to the ethereal and other-worldly forms that dominate her oeuvre as well as exploring her influence in a broader global and political context. With around 100 works, many rarely exhibited before in the UK, the major retrospective that the book accompanies will highlight the artist's pioneering abstract sculptures, and will explore the experimental methods of her beautifully contorted, organic shapes and forms.

Interested in biomorphology and how she could use unique casting methods to create simultaneously solid and delicate works, this publication celebrates the fragile and corporeal, the soft and the solid; and provides the perfect

introduction to the artist with seminal texts recognising her legacy of experimental and abstract sculptural works produced predominantly in the context of socialist Czechoslovakia.



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


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J.M.W. TURNER: THE 'WILSON' SKETCHBOOK

ANDREW WILTON

AN ELEGANT FACSIMILE OF ONE OF THE MOST FASCINATING OF TURNER'S EARLY SKETCHBOOKS

Of the nearly three hundred sketchbooks in Turner's (1775–1851) house at the time of his death, and now in the care of the Clore Gallery, this little volume is one of the most delightful and fascinating. The 'Wilson' Sketchbook (so-named in reference to the Welsh landscape painter Richard Wilson, and accounted for by the presence in the book of a number of copies after Wilson's pictures) marks an important stage in the development of Turner's practice as a draughtsman and was in use in around 1796, when the artist was only 21 years old. It is a working notebook in which the pressing demands of an increasingly fertile imagination are given expression as it forges a new language for itself: a language that was radically to affect the history of both watercolour and oil painting in the romantic period and long afterward.


The mesmerising sketches gathered here are accompanied by a valuable introduction which places the book in the context of Turner's life and work, and helps to identify much of the subject matter. This charming facsimile edition is a must for the serious scholar as well as a beautiful gift for any art lover.

NAUM GABO: CONSTRUCTIONS FOR REAL LIFE

EDITED BY SARA MATSON AND GILES JACKSON

ACCOMPANYING THE FIRST EXTENSIVE PRESENTATION OF NAUM GABO'S SCULPTURES, PAINTINGS, DRAWINGS AND ARCHITECTURAL DESIGNS TO BE HELD IN THE UK FOR OVER 30 YEARS

2020 marks the centenary of *The Realistic Manifesto*, a set of pioneering artistic principles launched in Moscow by Naum Gabo (1890–1977) with his brother Antoine Pevsner (1884–1962). The statement foregrounded the tenets of Gabo's constructivist ideals – that authentically modern art should engage with and reflect the modern age – a concept that he, alongside the likes of Tatlin, Kandinsky and Malevich, strived to convey in his work.

This book draws together some of the most definitive works by the acclaimed constructivist accompanied by incisive texts highlighting the key themes of his practice and his age. The illustrated works are drawn primarily from the complementary collections of Gabo's work held at Tate and the Berlinische Galerie in Berlin, Germany.

THEASTER GATES: AMALGAM

EDITED BY KASIA REDZISZ AND LAURA BRUNI

HIGHLY ACCESSIBLE VOLUME FEATURING THREE ESSAYS ON GATES'S CURRENT PRACTICE AND MATERIAL

Theaster Gates (b.1973) is one of the world's most influential living artists. In this new book (published to accompany a major show at Tate Liverpool) the artist explores the complex and interweaving issues of race, territory and inequality in the United States.

Gates takes the history of Malaga (a small island off the coast of Maine) as his point of departure. During the 19th century, Malaga was home to an ethnically mixed community. In 1912, on the orders of the state governor, Malaga's inhabitants were forcibly removed to the mainland, and offered no housing, jobs or support. *Amalgam* presents an array of sculpture, installation, film and dance that responds to this history. The book will also include illustrations of a new film, *Dance of Malaga* 2019, featuring the choreography of acclaimed American dancer, Kyle Abraham.

Combining scholarly essays, Gates's own words, and a careful selection of illustrations, this publication will underline the artist's engagement with contemporary art, urban planning, social conscience and interracial relationships, while its tone and accessible approach will appeal to all readers.

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

DON McCULLIN

WITH TEXTS BY SIMON BAKER, SHOAIR MAVLIAN AND AÏCHA MEHREZ

CELEBRATING McCULLIN'S REMARKABLE PRACTICE THROUGH HIS BEST-KNOWN WORK ALONGSIDE RARELY SEEN PICTURES

Accompanying an exhibition at Tate Liverpool of iconic British photographer, Don McCullin (b.1935), this exquisitely produced book includes his work from the mid-1950s to the present. Highlighting all areas of McCullin's output, it reflects his long career as a conflict photographer, social documentary practice, travel assignments and his more recent engagement with landscape. This new edition to accompany Tate Liverpool's exhibition features newly-printed images of Liverpool and the North of England taken in the 1960s and 70s.

A native Londoner, McCullin began to take photographs in the 1950s documenting his surroundings and local community, including the gangs in his neighbourhood. In 1958 his photograph *The Guvnors* – a portrait of a

notorious Finsbury Park gang who were involved in the murder of a police officer – was published in the *Observer*, launching his career as a photojournalist. He went on to become one of the best-known war correspondents in the country.


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


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





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SPRING DAVID TRIGG

Following Tate's *Winter* (2019) publication, this new selection of works examines the most beautiful, transformative and amusing expressions of the spring season drawn from Tate's collection.

Divided into key themes – 'Blossom and Blooms', 'Into the Landscape', 'In the Garden', 'Agriculture', 'Rebirth' and 'Uprising' – this little book considers how the traditional season of growth and rebirth has influenced artists over centuries. Works of art – including paintings, drawings, sculptures, illustrations and installations – are punctuated by brief captions adding background detail or additional information about the art, artists and their subjects. Featured artists include: Barbara Hepworth, Damien Hirst, Salvador Dalí, William Blake, Andy Warhol and Alex Katz.

Examining the season's hazy evenings and heated moments, plus the artists who sought to capture them, the book is thematically divided into sections covering 'Return of Helios', 'The Green Tide', 'Sweat', 'Winding Down' and 'Mercury Rising'. Featured artists include: Bridget Riley, Lorna Simpson, Henry Moore, Lisa Milroy, Mary Adshead, Ethel Walker, Chris Killip, Dora Carrington and Paul Cézanne.
